

# Neighbors of murdered woman miffed at police

SAN BERNARDINO — Neighborhood residents where a kidnap-murder occurred March 30 said Sunday they will hold a rally Tuesday evening to urge greater police action in the case.

The residents, admittedly edgy, said they were concerned by a number of "strange coincidences" involving a white German shepherd type dog, the kind belonging to the family of the victims, and cars thought to be look alikes of a gold Camaro type vehicle believed connected with the crime.

Beverly Wise, 26, of 1505 Alto Drive, was found stabbed to death in her home and two of her children, Brandi Jondell Summers, 5, and Tiffany Wise, 2, were abducted. Jondell (the name Brandi answers to) suffers from cystic fibrosis and needs medication daily.

Ken Selby said the rally will begin at 7 p.m. Tuesday in front of his home at 1530 Alto Drive.

"We are inviting the mayor, the chief of police, the investigators on the case, the council and the public at large," Selby said.

A petition was being passed around the neighborhood that said the citizens of the neighborhood feel the police "should delve deeper" into the case and keep the family of Air Force Sgt. Claude Wise, the dead woman's husband, and people in the area better informed.

"We are not satisfied that the investigation has been a thorough one," Selby said.

Selby said that the Sunday night following the kidnap-murder, he confronted two men walking in the neighborhood. He added that parked nearby was a gold Camaro type car. He said the men told him they were new in the neighborhood and they were looking for a white German Shepherd dog.

Selby continued that a police car came by and he told the officers about the two men, who were immediately picked up.

He said he was informed by police that night that the men did not live in the neighborhood and that they were released.

"The police called me less than an hour later. Those men weren't even in custody for one hour. There were two neighbors who saw the actual kidnap-murder car and the police never took those people to identify the car (the two men were in)," Selby said.

Efforts to reach San Bernardino police Sgt. John Klein, who is head-

ing the investigation, were unsuccessful Sunday.

Don White of 3770 La Hacienda St. said he saw a gold type Camaro car about 11:15 a.m. Sunday cruising the neighborhood.

White said he got in his car to give chase but the other vehicle sped away. He said he informed sheriff's deputies who were in a patrol car nearby and police and a helicopter were dispatched to the neighborhood.

Dale Martin of 1520 Alto Drive said a neighbor was walking her dog at 6 a.m. Sunday when she saw a foreign type compact car parked on his front lawn and two men with a leash

were looking over his fence into his yard.

"When they saw her they took off fast as hell," Martin said.

Tire tracks across his driveway and lawn were visible Sunday afternoon.

People in the neighborhood, who were gathered around Selby's house Sunday, said that they were edgy.

Martin said his wife refuses to stay home alone at night and remains with a neighbor until he comes home from work.

Wise's mother, Donna Howlett said, "this is a neighborhood that is living in terror. All these incidents and there is no motive."

## Experimental aircraft show set for Chino

CHINO — Announcing in advance, "This is not a collection of kooks," the Experimental Aircraft Association said it will host the 3rd annual Southern California regional fly-in April 29 and 30 and May 1 at Chino Airport.

Experimental (homebuilt) airplanes from throughout the West, including fixed-wing craft, sailplanes and rotorcraft, will be on display, said fly-in chairman Guy Veasey. Builders will exhibit and demonstrate their planes on the ground and in the air.

Airshows will highlight the April 30 and May 1 events, with performances by several aerobatic acts. An all-girl sky diving team will perform several times.

Veasey said displays will represent every era of aviation history plus what the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has in mind for the future.

"This is not a collection of kooks. The quality of workmanship meets or exceeds what you would expect to see at a custom auto show," Veasey said. "The association is a non-profit, international organization of aircraft builders, pilots and enthusiasts who promote safety and education in sport aviation."

A \$2 admission will be charged on April 30 and May 1 only. Children under 12 will be admitted free if accompanied by an adult.

The airport is located at Euclid Avenue and Merrill Road.
