

Witness links Summers to murder map

CHINO — The mysterious road-map that was left at a murder-kidnap scene is the same one to which murder defendant Roy Summers apparently had access, a prosecution witness testified Monday.

"I'm positive this is the same map," Angelina Adams said.

The map represents one-third of the prosecution's case against Summers, who is accused of fatally stabbing his ex-wife, Beverly Wise, and abducting two of her young daughters five years ago in San Bernardino.

The children still are missing.

Summers is the father of one of the youngsters, Brandi Jondell Summers, who was 5 years old when she disappeared with her 2-year-old half-sister, Tiffani. The crimes were committed March 30, 1977, at the victims' home in the 1500 block of Alto Drive.

Deputy District Attorney Michael Smith is trying to prove that Summers killed the woman out of hatred and kidnapped the girls because they witnessed the slaying.

The roadmap is one of the few pieces of evidence that police found at the scene.

Summers' fingerprints weren't found on the map. However, the prosecutor is trying to prove that the map belonged to another of Summers' ex-wives, Luella Tullis, and that he took it from her home in Northern California and left it at the murder scene.

Tullis told the jury last week that the map looks like the one she used to own, but said she can't be certain. Tullis also said that Summers and James Adams, one of her former boyfriends, had access to the map.

James Adams, now Angelina's
