

Missing Girl In Urgent Need Of Medicine

SAN BERNARDINO (AP) — Two small girls believed kidnaped after their mother was stabbed to death last Thursday are still missing, and police said Wednesday that one of them urgently needs medication for cystic fibrosis.

Beverly Wise, 26, was found dead in her home by her husband, Air Force Sgt. Claude

Wise, who is stationed at Norton Air Force Base near this city 60 miles east of Los Angeles. Two of her children, Brandi Summers, 5, and Tiffany Wise, 2, were missing and believed kidnaped.

The Summers girl suffers from cystic fibrosis and requires regular medication, said police detective David

Franz.

"She was in the habit of taking her own medication," Franz said. "She knew when to take it and that if she didn't she would get very sick."

Franz said he hoped a doctor somewhere in the state soon would report being contacted for medication in such a case.

—Police at first believed the

two girls' disappearance stemmed from a child custody dispute and sought Mrs. Wise's ex-husband, Roy Summers of Livermore in Northern California, for questioning. Investigators have since decided Summers was not involved and they are baffled, Franz said.

"We've got a task force working on it but so far we've

turned up nothing tangible," he said, noting that Summers' statement that he was elsewhere at the time of the crime checked out.

"Right now our mood is optimistic," Franz said. "I'm drawing on the fact that the girls weren't killed in the home and that whoever took them has some element of kindness and is caring for them."

A white man with short reddish-brown hair, "which would be consistent with military personnel," and wearing a blue vertical-stripe shirt and dark slacks was seen escorting the younger child to a gold Camaro the day Mrs. Wise died, Franz said. The man was also described by one witness as wearing a black "leather-type" jacket. The 5-year-old girl was not seen at the time and has not been seen or heard from since.

An 8-month-old daughter of the Wises was left in the home unharmed.

Mrs. Wise, who died of a single stab wound in the chest, was buried in the Northern California community of Santa Clara on Tuesday.

Sandy Hill Joins 'Good Morning America'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sandy Hill, a reporter for KABC-TV here and a former Washington state beauty queen, will be the new co-host on ABC's "Good Morning America" show, effective April 25, ABC said Wednesday.

She replaces singer-actress Nancy Dussault, who is resigning April 22 to resume her theatrical career. Miss Dussault, who co-hosts ABC's morning show with actor David Hartman, joined it in November 1975.

Miss Hill, 30, a veteran of more than 7½ years in television news here and in Seattle, Washington, joins "Good

anchor on rival KNXT-TV here. That station is owned by CBS.

Miss Hill, who won a local Emmy news award while at KNXT, is a 1966 "Miss Washington" beauty contest winner and a 1968 graduate of the University of Washington, a KABC spokesman said.

Although now in news, she started her career in banking, serving as a personnel assistant at a Seattle bank before joining station KIRO-TV there

in September 1969 as a news-writer, then a producer and reporter.

She also worked as a co-anchor on newscasts at KIRO until she joined KNXT here.

A KABC spokesman said Miss Hill, the first woman to regularly co-anchor a weeknight newscast in Los Angeles when at KNXT, is married to a banker and lives in suburban Brentwood.

Her salary as the new co-host on "Good Morning America" wasn't disclosed. The program competes each weekday morning with NBC's "Today" and the "CBS Morning News."

She's the third woman to co-host the morning show ABC began in January two years ago under the title "A.M. America," which later was changed to the present "Good Morning America."

The original co-host, actress and local personality Stephanie Edwards, resigned in the spring of 1975 to leave New York and resume her career in Los Angeles.

Last month, Miss Edwards, whose broadcast career ironically began as a local talk show co-host on KABC here, signed with rival KNXT to do various informational specials.
