

Testimony hits at Summers' alibi

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CHINO — Murder defendant Roy Summers' alibi doesn't hold up, according to a 17-year-old boy's testimony here Thursday.

Summers, 41, is charged with fatally stabbing his ex-wife, Beverly Wise, and kidnapping two of her young daughters in San Bernardino on March 30, 1977.

Summers says he moved to Beryl Junction, Utah, the day before the crimes and worked there all the next day. However, George Moyle — who was 12 years old in March 1977 — testified that he's absolutely certain he watched a particular TV movie with Summers on the night Summers arrived in Utah.

That film, an Errol Flynn war movie called "Dawn Patrol," reportedly was broadcast by a Salt Lake City television station on March 31 — the day *after* the crimes were committed.

However, Moyle's memory of that night is dim. Under questioning, he could remember few details, including whether he watched the entire picture.

Summers could be sentenced to life in prison if he's convicted of the murder-kidnap charges.

Although the children have not been found, investigators believe they are alive. Summers is the father of the elder child, Brandi Jondell Wise who was 5 years old when she disappeared. Her half-

sister, Tiffani Wise, was 2.

Deputy District Attorney Michael Smith is trying to prove that Summers murdered the woman out of hatred and kidnapped the girls because they witnessed the slaying.

Defense attorney Timothy Guhin says his client had nothing to do with the crimes. Summers is the victim of a faulty and unethical police investigation, Guhin has told the jury.

One of Summers' other ex-wives, Luella Tullis, has corroborated Summers' alibi, despite what she says were concerted efforts by one police detective to pressure her

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
