complaint against Iwakiri to include the larger time frame. She was bound over for trial, but no trial date has been set.

San Bernardino Police Lt. Don Levan said Thursday that detectives only recently obtained the information that the children were seen in Boise so soon after their abduction.

Roy Summers, the dead woman's ex-husband and Brandi's father, is charged in the kidnapping and murder. He is currently in an Oregon jail awaiting extradition to California.

Levan said Thursday he didn't know what Iwakiri's connection to Summers is, except that she is the sister of Lee Casner's brother's wife.

Casner has told detectives that he knows Summers and the two were reported seen together several times last summer in the Boise area.

Casner, of Cedar Ridge, Calif., is charged in the case with accessory to kidnapping and felony child concealment because he was reportedly seen with the missing sisters near his home.

Following a 3½-day preliminary hearing in San Bernardino County Municipal Court that ended Wednesday, Casner was bound over for trial.

In another development Thursday, the Idaho Supreme Court denied an appeal by Mike Iwakiri, Juanita's husband, that he not have to obey a subpoena requiring him to testify before the San Bernardino County Grand Jury today, the court's clerk said.

Mike Iwakiri's attorney, Jon Wyman, said Thursday that his client wanted time to arrange for the trip so it would disturb his routine schedule as little as possible. Iwakiri was told Monday that he would have to be in San Bernardino in four days, Wyman said, and no reason was given for the subpoena.

The grand jury is inquiring into the murder-kidnapping. Others who have testified before jurors regarding the case include Roy and Sandy Frazier of Nampa, Idaho, a Boise suburb; attorney Robert Aldridge from the Boise area; and Robert James Casner, the brother of Lee Casner.

Chief Trial Deputy District Attorney Joseph Canty has declined to say why people are being questioned by the grand jury. But court sources say it is a move often made because witnesses refuse to talk to police.

Attorney Aldrich also testified at Juanita Iwakiri's preliminary hearing, but because the press was barred, details of what he said aren't known.
